BSHS Winter Showcase & Market

Purpose and Objectives:

Our goal for the BSHS Winter Showcase and Market was to showcase our talented students in one event for the community and raise money for an important cause.

Brief Description:

Originally, the Winter Showcase was to be held on December 9, from 6 to 8 at the city amphitheater, but due to weather, it was moved to our high school auditorium. People from the school and community were able to come watch performances, shop at a market curated by the different organizations, and take pictures with Santa or a beautiful winter backdrop.

Description of Involvement:

Prior to the event, student council members worked with city leaders for approval to use our city amphitheater. They also worked with local media organizations to promote the event. In addition, officers spoke with all school organizations to get them on board. In the showcase, we had acts from choir, theatre, ASL, our dance team, color guard, and band. A total of 205 students performed. We have attached a line up of our acts as one picture. Outside of the auditorium, the holiday market highlighted our talented CTE students as they sold goods they created. We had students from photography, graphic design, life skills, interior design, art club, fashion design, welding, construction, landscape design, cheer, culinary, and student council all selling items they had designed and created. In all, 460 students helped make & sell goods. Student council also set up a Santa picture station and a teacher volunteered to be Santa for the night. Each organizations' faculty members oversaw their own performances or market stalls. Student council advisors and members organized the entire event, line up, and market. We also had student council volunteers help collect donations for the American Cancer Society instead of charging for tickets to the event. Overall, all these performances and organizations selling goods made for a fantastic showcase of what our school has to offer and how talented our students as BSHS are!
