## Board of Directors Policy Regarding Endorsements and/or Partnerships

Programs/projects that complement the mission and purpose of student council may be considered by the Board for an endorsement/partnership. Programs or projects interested in forming a partnership with TASC must demonstrate in writing the ways in which the program enhances the work of or provides a resource to student councils. Programs/projects sponsored by member schools are preferred. The Board will approve this type of relationship at the summer board meeting. The board may determine to limit the number of endorsed programs. These relationships benefit TASC member schools directly, either by providing a resource to the council or to individual students. Endorsed programs often exhibit at TASC events and present at TASC events. Benefits to an endorsed program/partner may include access to member schools data for marketing, inclusion in conferences through presentations and reduced exhibit rates, a link on the TASC website, and inclusion in the TASC Resource Guide. Relationships are established by a board vote and are renewed annually. Existing programs must demonstrate participation by and benefit to schools and justify the continuation of the relationship in writing.

<b>Mission/Purpose of Organization</b>	<p>Teens in the Driver Seat® is the first peer-to-peer program for teens that focuses solely on traffic safety and addresses all major risks for this age group and involves teenagers directly in developing and delivering driving safety messages.</p> <p>The mission of Teens in the Driver Seat® is to raise awareness of the top driving dangers for teens and prevent crashes involving young drivers.</p> <p>The program seeks to save lives and prevent injury among youth through education, empowerment, and peer-led outreach.</p>

<p><b>How does your mission align with the goals/purpose of Texas Student Councils? (See About Us tab at <a href="http://www.tasconline.org">www.tasconline.org</a>.)</b></p>	<p>The Teens in the Driver Seat® (TDS) program is a peer-to-peer traffic safety initiative designed by teens for teens. Just like TASC, TDS empowers students to develop leadership skills by serving as program ambassadors and creating lifelong positive impact changes in their community.</p> <p>Upon starting the program, students take on leadership roles, designing and structuring activities that best address the unique needs of their school and peers. They are encouraged to collaborate within their team and schools to effectively customize and implement the program's efforts at their school and in their community.</p>
<p><b>Describe in detail the process for TASC member school participation in this program.</b></p>	<p>To participate in the Teens in the Driver Seat® program, TASC member schools should use this process:</p> <p><b>Step 1: Identify team members and enroll in TDS</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Once a team has been identified and established, the team will fill out and submit an order form for their free <a href="#">TDS Resource Tool Kit</a>. The items in the toolkit are used to remind students about safe driving. Schools must re-enroll every year to be considered a TDS Program school and to receive rewards.</li> </ul> <p><b>Step 2: Find out what people know</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Administer TDS Surveys to students on your campus. This will help to assess the students' levels of driving risk awareness as well as their driving behavior. A report of the survey findings will be sent to the school after completion. <i>This qualifies as a TDS All-Star!</i></li> </ul> <p><b>Step 3: Spread the Safe Driving Message</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Once the students have completed the surveys, the team is ready to start informing and changing the students' attitudes about driving safety. Teams are encouraged to plan out activities for the year by using the activity guides and resources provided. Teams earn cash prizes after they complete activities and submit the activity/event form.</li> </ul> <p><b>Step 4: Keep the program going</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>We encourage program schools to plan activities throughout the entire school year. Participate in the All-Star Awards program by submitting activities and events conducted at their school or in their community, so that the students are reminded of the TDS safety message. Lastly, it is important that at the end of the school year, students recruit new team leaders to plan for and continue the program for the next school year.</li> </ul>
<p><b>What is the benefit of this partnership to the TASC organization as a whole, its member schools or individual advisors/students?</b></p>	<p>For over 20 years, the Teens in the Driver Seat program has been a vital resource in helping to educate students about transportation safety in Texas.</p> <p>Through our partnership, TASC students gain access to a proven, data-driven program that empowers them to become advocates for traffic safety. This collaboration allows TASC to align with a statewide</p>

	<p>initiative that actively engages teens in educating their peers, families, and communities about the leading risks associated with teen driving crashes.</p> <p>Teens help shape the program and are responsible for implementing it and educating their peers and parents; Texas A&amp;M Transportation Institute (TTI) provides the science, guidance, and project resources.</p> <p>Additionally, the program also helps develop leadership skills among students and facilitates opportunities for them to serve on the statewide Teens in the Drive Seat® Teen Advisory Board (TAB). This TAB involvement has helped many students enhance their leadership skills, get community service credit(s) and bolster their resumes as they work toward goals beyond high school. Lastly, the program is now a President's Volunteer Service Award-certifying organization.</p>
<b>What is the benefit of this partnership to your organization?</b>	<p>Partnering with TASC has enabled the Teens in the Driver Seat® program to effectively reach young drivers, passengers, and vulnerable road users, helping to promote a healthier driving safety culture. This collaboration ensures that young leaders are at the forefront of that mission. We look forward to continuing our partnership with TASC so that this trend can continue.</p>
<b>Is there a fee for TASC schools to attain resources or participate in the program</b>	<p>No, the Teens in the Driver Seat program is available for all Texas junior high and high schools at no cost.</p>
<b>Does participation in this program require student fundraising of any type?</b>	<p>No, participation with the Teens in the Driver Seat program does not require any fundraising to be involved.</p>
<b>Is this program available to student councils statewide?</b>	<p>Yes, the Teens in the Driver Seat program is available to all Texas junior high and high schools.</p>
<b>Describe in detail the resources available to TASC schools through this partnership.</b>	<p>Enrolled TDS schools receive a free robust resource kit with educational outreach items, guides, and activity ideas to support their action plans. Program schools receive access to all available downloads, activity ideas, presentations, guides, and other online resources to help promote the safe driving message at their school. Additionally, virtual and in-person resources are available to schools/students to download free of charge. <p><b>Describe the plan for serving schools across the state of Texas.</b></p>	<p>Teens in the Driver Seat® (TDS) continues to help reduce the number of teen driver fatalities and car crashes on Texas roads. TDS will continue to involve all partners in expanding and supporting the program to reach more schools and teens across Texas. This expanded partnership will benefit participating TASC schools by making available a greater amount of assistance and support in the form of volunteer effort as well as financial sponsorship at the local school level.</p>
